HONORING OUR LEGACY, BUILDING OUR FUTURE

In October 1891, a group of well-to-do individuals came together to discuss the economic struggles and social injustices facing the South End community and how they could work alongside residents to effect change. Quick to action, on January 1, 1892, Andover House opened its doors to the community. By launching the first settlement house in Boston, those men and women pioneered the social justice movement with a philosophy of neighbors helping neighbors. In 1960, five of the early settlement programs merged into United South End Settlements, the name we proudly carry today. Now, USES is visioning a bold path forward that mobilizes and engages all community members to disrupt the cycle of poverty for children and families in our neighborhood.
